

Come and plant trees for wildfire recovery on Make A Difference Day

Dyer Hill is an area southwest of Bridgeport known for wide open sagebrush landscapes and the threatened sharp-tailed grouse. In the recent Pearl Hill Fire, nearly all of Dyer Hill was burned, including much of the wetland trees and shrubs the sharp-tailed grouse depends on for food and shelter. Together with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, and a concerned land owner, Foster Creek



Conservation District seeks to put 2,500 native plants in the ground along West Foster Creek on Dyer Hill. These plants will jump start fire recovery, help prevent erosion damage, and eventually provide needed food sources and habitat for sharp-tailed grouse and other wildlife. We need your help to make this planting a success! Come out and enjoy a morning of socially distanced planting with coffee and snacks provided.

Please bring a facial covering, water container, and gardening gloves. A 4-wheel drive vehicle with high clearance is recommended, but we will also have an open-air shuttle into the ranch for anyone who needs it.

Where: Dyer Hill, southwest of Bridgeport and just south of the West Foster Creek Wildlife Area
